#### **Branch Secretary's report**

At the AGM on 20<sup>th</sup> February, held online via Zoom, all Branch Officers remained in post with the exception that Rob Needham stood down as the Youth Officer and Alison Clayton stood down as Newsletter Editor. Holley Wakeling was duly elected as Youth Officer, and Rob Needham as Newsletter Editor. No new members were elected this year. After the AGM we held a short social quiz followed by a practice on Ringing Room.

Before tower ringing started up again, All Saints Wokingham were ringing handbells outside for Sunday service. They also rang a number of handbell quarters, including on 11<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> April in memoriam of HRH The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh. A number of towers also rang in memoriam; Arborfield, Easthampstead, Hurst, Sonning, Wargrave, and Wokingham All Saints rang 99 Tolling half-muffled. White Waltham rang Nine Tailors and 99 Tolling. Prior to the funeral on 17<sup>th</sup> April, half-muffled tolling by Binfield, Easthampstead, Sonning, Twyford, Wargrave, White

At the AGM on 20<sup>th</sup> February, held online via Zoom, all Waltham and Wokingham all Saints. A number of towers Branch Officers remained in post with the exception that Rob Needham stood down as the Youth Officer and Alison 6pm, including Sonning and St Paul's Wokingham.

There were no branch practices for most of the year, other than elementary practices on Ringing Room. However, we have recently successfully run both Advance (Surprise) (Hurst) and Elementary (Binfield) practices, and all regular branch practices are now back on the schedule.

Sadly, two branch members passed away this year; Arthur Moss, August 2021 and Mary Spence, December 2021. Both were ringers at Wokingham, All. Saints.

There has been little opportunity for recruitment of new learners, however Sonning recruited one new member, and Binfield and Wokingham All Saints have both recruited three new learners. One from Binfield sadly dropped out, but the other two are progressing well.

#### **Ringing Master's report**

No branch ringing occurred during the first half of the year due to the national lockdown. I did though organise three Elementary Virtual practices that took place in April, May and June which were attended on average by 8 people. Once ringing had fully resumed in July, I stopped organising these virtual practices on the basis that we would resume our normal practices.

To help understand how the pandemic had affected ringing in our branch in August I organised a review of each tower. Most towers reported a loss of ringers and approximately half were unable to ring all their bells. Based on the feedback I received from our tower correspondents I made the following recommendation:

- Resumption of all branch practices (Binfield daytime, Elementary, Surprise, Monthly)
- Branch practices organised at 'Covid friendly' towers
- Consider sponsoring an ART handling training course to increase the number of people in the branch who can teach bell handling
- Develop a branch recruitment campaign for new or returning ringers

These recommendations were reviewed during the November business meeting where it was agreed we would resume branch practices. We also agreed to run our regular practices with a specific focus, e.g. Plain doubles, minor or major methods, as well as continuing with the Elementary and Advanced practices. Our Advanced practices resumed in November and December at Hurst which is a relatively 'Covid' friendly tower.

Ringing resumed in some of our branch churches when restrictions were lifted in May and the first quarter peal rung

was at Waltham St. Lawrence on the 10th June. In total 27 quarter peals were recorded in the branch with the leading churches being All Saints Wokingham and Shottesbrooke, each recording 9 quarter peals.
