Tercentenary of Stedman's death

Ringing World readers will already know about this, but for those who don't, it is an important anniversary.

We all know Stedman the method, but the Fabian Stedman after whom it is named did much more than invent it. He published the first two books on change ringing: *Tintinnalogia* in 1668 (a joint effort with Richard Duckworth who supplied much of the content) and *Campanalogia* in 1677 (which Stedman wrote as well as published). At the time, change ringing was still evolving, and was confined to a few places in England. Writing things down was a key step in helping change ringing to spread and develop.

The exact dates of Stedman's birth and death aren't known. He was baptised at Yarkhill, Herefordshire on 7 December 1640, second son of the Reverend Francis Stedman. He was apprenticed to a master printer in London where he became a prominent ringer, first with the Cheapside Scholars and then with the College Youths, of which he was Master in 1682. In later life he became auditor to Customs and Excise for the Crown, and appears to have dropped out of ringing. He died in 1713 and was buried on 16 November at the parish church of St Andrew Undershaft in the City of London.

The 300th anniversary of his burial is this year on Saturday 16 November. Ringers everywhere are being encouraged to mark the occasion by ringing, and to use the event to create publicity, both for their own bands and also for the art of ringing. The Central Council has produced material that you can re-use for local publicity along with your own stories, and also lots of compositions of Stedman in meaningful lengths: Short touches of 300 (years since his death), quarter peals of 1300 (ends in 300), Date touches of 1713 (year he died) and peals of 5300 (ends in 300).

Locally we are hoping to arrange some Branch ringing, possibly before or after the business meeting. Some towers are already making their own plans for ringing during the day. If your tower hasn't done so yet, try to arrange some ringing - Stedman if possible, or something else if you think that would be easier. Ring on the day if you can, but if that's not possible then ring shortly before or after.

Above all, make sure you publicise what you are doing, to your parish and your village or town, as well as local press. Tell them in advance – don't be modest and wait until afterwards. If the local press want to come along to take a picture of the band so much the better. This is a great opportunity to publicise ringing.

If you need help to make up band, or need a conductor, please let us know. If you have some good ideas about publicising the event that you think might be of interest to others, then let us know.

Twyford & Hurst ring the Royal Jubilee Bells, 31 August



The idea for a walking ringing tour of the City of London started following the fascinating talk given by Dickon Love at Twyford in April this year. Dickon gave a thoroughly entertaining lecture about the genesis and eventual resting place of the Royal Jubilee Bells that played a central role in the Queen's Diamond Jubilee pageant.

Looking at the bell map of the City, I decided that a day's outing would be manageable, for the relatively inexperienced bands of the Twyford and Hurst Benefice, centred around St James Garlickhythe where the Royal Jubilee Bells now hang.

The outing commenced at Twyford Station at a very respectable 11:00am and following safe delivery by First Great Western and the London Underground, our first tower was the ground floor ring of six bells at St Katherine Cree. The ringing here was made that much more challenging by the procession of orchestra members who insisted on coming through the ringing circle to attend their practice in the church.

After a short walk through the quiet streets of the City we arrived at St Olave Hart Street. The 8 bells here are regularly rung by the University of London band and despite it being holiday time, we managed to find a student to meet us and let us in. Ringing at this fine ring went with a spring as the ropes had been recently replaced.

Our next tower was a short notice replacement and so we found ourselves at the foot of the magnificent tower of St Magnus the Martyr. The bells were ringing as we arrived and we waited patiently at the foot for the previous band to descend. The bells here are in a different league from those with which most of the band is familiar; 12 bells, tenor of 26¾ cwt. Starting with some rounds on the light 6 to get the measure of them, we progressed through ringing on the back 8, then 10 and finally on all 12. This was a terrific achievement and everyone, for whom it was a first on 12, should be very proud.

And so to our final tower, and the original purpose of the trip – to ring the Royal Jubilee Bells. The instructions to make our way up to the ringing room took a little unravelling, but we soon found ourselves in the very smartly decorated ringing room and ringing on these famous bells. The party posed for the official photograph (above) after ringing and then repaired to a fine hostelry to revive ourselves before returning on the tube and train to Twyford. Thanks to all the participants for making a memorable day trip to London.

Tower Maintenance Award

Odd Bob always publishes the "current awards" list of the <u>Tower Maintenance Award Scheme</u>, and as editor of Odd Bob I see the latest list every 6 months. It shows all the towers in the ODG that have an award, and all the towers whose award has expired after its 2-year life. I see St. Andrew's, Sonning rising to the top of the *Expired* list, and when I get sufficiently embarrassed I arrange another inspection!

In this way St Andrew's has had three inspections since the scheme started. At the first inspection we achieved a Bronze award, at the second a Silver, and this time a Gold. This progression clearly shows the benefits of the inspection scheme, which shows you what needs attention in the ringing room and belfry. Going for an award ensures that all the bells and fittings get checked for wear, looseness, misalignment and damage, which in turn makes ringing a more pleasant and safer activity. The inspection process also reduces the chance of expensive repairs to tower fittings, so your PCC should be interested in supporting the scheme. It would be great if all the towers in our branch could gain a Tower Maintenance award.

As an aside, we found several spider webs on the wheel or headstock of some of our bells. I reckon that spiders don't get as dizzy as humans because I didn't notice any peculiarly shaped webs!
