# **New window at Easthampstead**

At this time last year, we were busy celebrating the Queen's Diamond Jubilee with a Flower Festival, from which some of the proceeds were going to help finance a stained glass window in the porch to commemorate the occasion.

Local businessman John Nike was so taken with our efforts when he visited the festival that he generously offered to donate the entire cost of the window.

The new window would stand beside our internationally renowned stained glass windows by the Pre-Raphaelite artist Sir Edward Burne-Jones. It was therefore decided that we ask one of the best stained glass artists of the 21<sup>st</sup>.century to take on the commission.

We were very lucky that Thomas Denny, who has made windows for several cathedrals, agreed to design and make our window.

Thomas Denny writes "The theme is baptism, an appropriate subject to be installed in the place of entering in. Specifically the design depicts the baptism of King Cynegils of Wessex by St. Birinus in 635, an event witnessed by King Oswald of Northumbria and that probably took place in Easthampstead.

Birinus, Cynegils, Oswald and two onlookers (daughters of Cynegils, one of whom was to marry Oswald) are seen by a spring on a hill top, a great vale stretching away in the distance. Cynegils has put aside his sword and crown and crown and kneels in humility as water and light pour onto his head".

# 9th June - A Memorable Day at Easthampstead continued

The window was duly installed last month, but was kept hidden from view until the unveiling and dedication of the window could be organised and for John Nike ( who had only seen a sketch of the design) to reveal it to the assembled dignitaries and congregation.

Whilst everyone was gathering outside the porch, we rang a quarter peal for the occasion and just managed to get downstairs in time for the unveiling.

Earlier in the week, the restored War Memorial was put back into the Churchyard, having been dismantled and taken away earlier in the year, as it had become structurally unsafe.

As all the local dignitaries would be present for the window unveiling, it was hurriedly decided to rededicate the War Memorial later on in the afternoon.

#### Easthampstead War Memorial.

The War Memorial was erected after the First World War following a public appeal by the Parish Council, under the guidance of Lady Haversham. As a result, £325 was raised by donations from 113 separate families around the parish. It seems that Lady Haversham was a lady of some influence for she managed to engage the noted architect Mr Temple Moore to design the monument –a free standing elegant cross on a stepped pedestal on which was to be engraved the names of 65 men from the parish who laid down their lives for their country.

The material chosen for the monument was Ham Hill stone which "would look better than granite". Unfortunately, this choice would create structural problems in the future. In all the total cost of the cross was £312 4s 6d.

In 2005, the War Memorial was deemed to be of Significant Architectural and Historical Importance and was granted the status of a Grade II listed monument.

For several years, there had been growing concern about the structural integrity and safety of the memorial, in particular of the Cross head and shaft.

Bracknell Forest Council and local councillors generously funded the recarving of the Cross head, the shaft and a general restoration of the base.

The original cross head has been installed in the Garden of Remembrance.





More general ringing followed, prior to a celebration choral evensong, to end a memorable day.

# Two Choirs Festival - with Bells

Invitations to ring can come from unexpected sources, which is how ringing came to be an official part of a music festival in Wokingham over Pentecost weekend.

Our new musical director Richard Smith was still around after a special practice for young children one Monday evening when I arrived for our weekly pre-practice session in the tower, so I invited him to come up and see what ringing was about. I showed him the bells and explained how they worked, using the model. He couldn't see 'real ringing' but he saw three of our ringers each practising with a simulator, and he could listen in on what one of them was doing. He was fascinated, and asked lots of questions, many relating to performance and the skills needed.

Around that time he was planning the festival, and he asked me if we could include ringing as a part of it. As well as a concert and a recital there were two choral services, one at each church. We agreed on a quarter peal at each church – after the service at All Saints (before would be impossible because we are open to the church and couldn't have rung through the choir rehearsal) and before the service at St Paul's (where the ringing room is upstairs).

As we were part of the official programme he wanted to know what we would be performing, to include it in the publicity. I didn't know who would be available to ring, so Ken Davenport (tower captain at St Paul's) and I decided to keep it simple. We also decided to ring a quarter each of Triples and Major in order to vary the music.

Then Richard asked me for a couple of pages of notes to be included in the glossy festival programme. I decided on a very brief introduction to the instrument and the music (illustrated with some pictures) followed by a brief description of the musical aspects of the two performances. It all had to be in language that non-ringers could understand, as well as fitting into the required space (two pages).
