Sonning Bellringers' 'scarecrow' banner

Over the late May bank-holiday weekend Sonning held its biennial Scarecrows and Open Gardens event. Sonning bell ringers, both tower and handbells, usually support this event, and this year was no exception.

There was no theme for the scarecrows for 2014, so we used a very familiar WWI recruitment poster picture and modified it for tower bell ringers. Our 'scarecrow' is a very large and flat one (except for the peak of the cap and the pointing finger), as you will see in the photo! We hung it from the battlements of the tower and fixed guy-lines at the bottom to peg it out taut.

This wonderful recruitment poster is now resting in a ringer's garage roof space, but it is available (with a bit of notice) to any tower in the branch that wants it for their open tower event. The banner is roughly 20 foot long and 8 foot wide but rolls up! Unfortunately the heavy rain on the bank holiday Monday loosened some of the pieces of material, so a bit of restoration work will be needed before it is displayed again but don't let this put you off!

To belong or not to belong?

Following on from Jacquie's article about belonging to more than one tower time there was a bit of discussion.

Elizabeth O'Brien from St Paul's Wokingham, (with 100 years of family association in the Branch), said that allegiance could come in many forms, whether as a visitor at a tower or seeing family members' names on peal boards. She also made the point that we rely on volunteers to run the Branch and collecting subs was not always a straightforward task already without any more complications!

However following this, John received clarification from the Guild Master. John has summarised this as follows:

I have been asked to clarify the issues raised by Jacquie Hazell in the Spring Newsletter. Belonging is indeed an excellent thing but belonging to a band is different from belonging to the Guild. Each is like being a member of a club, with duties and privileges, activities, voting rights, etc.

A ringer may choose to join as many bands as (s)he wishes. Most tower bands don't charge a membership fee but some do (I pay £5 per year to Reading St Mary & St Lawrence band).

The Guild is a very large club that operates as a federation of branches. All Guild members are registered in a branch which receives part of their Guild subscription (currently £3 out of £8). You can only be a member of the Guild once so you only need to pay one Guild subscription, but in the rare cases where a member wishes to register in a second branch (s)he pays an additional £3 to that branch. For example the Master pays £8 to EBSB and £3 to South Oxon.

For historic reasons the Guild lists members by branch and tower (apart from a few 'unattached' members who are only listed by branch). The Guild also collects its subscriptions via towers so in the Guild report members appear under the tower through which they pay their Guild subscription. Using myself as an example again, the Guild lists me under Wokingham through which I pay my Guild subscription, but it doesn't list me under Reading where although being a member of the band (and paying a tower subscription) I don't pay any extra Guild subscription.
